Democracy Corps Lesson Plan 1: What is Government?

"If students are going to embrace their civic responsibilities, it is critical that they understand why we have a government and what it demands of its citizens."

Purpose:

This lesson is a part of YLI's Democracy Corps service learning program. It defines the term "government" and challenges students to explain why people need a structured government.

Materials:

• Novel: The Lord of the Flies By William Golding

Chapter 1 (excerpt)
Chapter 11 (excerpt)

OR

• Video: *The Lord of the Flies* (1990) R-rated. Castle Rock

Entertainment/Columbia Pictures

Clip 1: First 18 minutes Clip 2: Last 14 minutes

Student Deliberation Guidlines

• Student Guide 1: Lord of the Flies

Central Questions:

What is government? Why is it necessary?

Procedure:

- 1. Warm Up Present the scenario below and brainstorm answers in small groups. Imagine all the adults vanish from the school building and the students are left in charge.
 - Who would decide the rules for the school?
 - How would decisions be made?
 - Who would be sure the rules were followed?

Record student answers. Inform students that they are about to read/view a situation close to what they just imagined. Ask them to pay close attention to how the boys organize themselves, how they pick a leader and how they make decisions.



- 2. View movie clip one or read the Chapter 1 excerpt beginning with the passage "Signs of life were now visible on the island." Stop at the end of the meeting on the beach.
- 3. Pause and describe the middle of the story as a battle for control between the two tribes. Jack's tribe, the Hunters, stop following the rules and over time become violent. Now the tribes are in a struggle for the most valuable item on the island, Piggy's glasses.
- 4. View movie clip two or read the Chapter 11excerpt beginning with the passage "They set off along the beach in formation" and stop at the end of the chapter.
- 5. Distribute Student Guide 1: *Lord of the Flies* and ask students to complete.
- 6. Close session with class deliberation.
 - Deliberate
 Introduce and discuss **Deliberation Guidelines** with students.

 Use the questions below to complete the first Democracy Corps deliberation.
 - Questions:
 Based on the examples of government in this story, which type of government is more effective? Why?
 - Differentiation
 Ask students to read the entire novel.

Student Deliberation Guidelines

- 1. Bring a copy of the text or the deliberation questions with you to reference during the discussion.
- 2. Share your ideas often.
- 3. Be respectful of your peers' views and opinions by listening AND not criticizing other students for differing responses.
- 4. When discussing information from a text, support your ideas with references from the text.
- 5. Ask questions during the seminar that are related to the discussion.
- 6. Speak in a conversational tone.
- 7. When speaking to your peers, use their names.
- 8. Recognize that many times, there are no "right" or "wrong" answers.
